Councilmembers in attendance were: Gregory, Chester, Wheeler, Futcher, Karnofski, and Student Representative Jared Cadwell. Councilmembers Slater and McDaniel were absent the entire meeting.

<u>Minutes:</u> Upon Motion by Councilmember Futcher and seconded by Councilmember Wheeler, 'Approve the minutes of the 3/6/07 Regular Meeting,' motion carried, all voting yes.

CITIZEN'S BUSINESS:

<u>Richard Peters</u>, 720 Abernathy Creek Rd., Longview, spoke from the audience representing the Landowners and Citizens for a Safe Community. They would like the Kelso City Council to consider adopting a resolution against the LNG (liquefied natural gas) plant. City Attorney Brachvogel stated he would work with Mr. Peters to put a resolution together.

Jeremy Hooper, 408 Oak Street, spoke from the audience about the success of the skate park fundraiser that was held March 16th at the Kelso Theatre Pub. Jeremy said the kids had a lot of fun. They received \$580 in donations and Jeremy put in some money to bring the total to \$800. Two more fundraisers are planned and he will continue working until the skate park is built. Due to Jeremy's concerns about the proper handling of funds, it was suggested Jeremy could get some advice from City Attorney Brachvogel. Councilmember Futcher donated \$200 to bring the total to \$1,000.

Boy Scouts:

<u>Tammi Perry, District Executive President of the Great Chinook District</u>, 1407 Commerce, Longview, spoke about the Boy Scout program which is available to kids of all ages providing character development, citizenship training, and personal fitness.

<u>Jesse Ramirez, Membership Chairperson</u>, spoke about the scouting program and the benefits it can bring to boys and their families especially when the parents volunteer in the program.

Crime Victim Advocacy Program:

Linda Asher, 604 N. 23rd, Kelso, spoke about the Crime Victim Advocacy Program which covers Cowlitz, Wahkiakum, and Clark Counties. The program is a joint collaboration between the Emergency Support Shelter and the Ethnic Support Council providing a 24-hour crisis center, information and referrals, and in-person advocacy. On April 25th there will be a National Crime Victims' Celebration at the Cowlitz PUD meeting room between 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m.
