Chaplain Steve White, Kelso Police Department, gave the invocation. Mayor David Futcher led the flag salute. The Regular Meeting of the Kelso City Council was called to order by Mayor Futcher. Councilmembers in attendance were: Futcher, Karnofski, Myers, Roberson, and Malella.

Minutes: Upon motion by Councilmember Roberson, seconded by Councilmember Myers, 'Approve the minutes of the 4/20/10 Regular Meeting.' Mayor Futcher noted there was one small correction in Councilmember Myer's report. Motion carried, all voting yes.

PROCLAMATIONS:

Mayor Futcher read a proclamation declaring May 2010 as <u>Mental Health Awareness</u> <u>Month</u> in the City of Kelso. Eric Yakovich, a representative of Cowlitz County Guidance Association and the Lower Columbia Mental Health Center, accepted the proclamation and spoke about the importance of awareness and treatment. People can recover from mental illness and lead full, productive lives in the community.

Mayor Futcher read a proclamation declaring the week of May 9 through May 15, 2010, as <u>National Police Week</u> in the City of Kelso. Chief of Police Andrew Hamilton accepted the proclamation and gave a power point presentation honoring police officers. Special tribute was given to Officer Frank Konen, who was shot and killed in Kelso on March 27, 1948. He left behind his wife and baby. Chief Hamilton also thanked the reserve officers who have donated 472 hours this year. Six reserve officers were present. Chaplain White spoke about the courageous men and women who put their lives on the line every day. In 2009, 116 peace officers lost their lives. He spoke about the fifteen children in Washington State who lost a parent because their mom or dad wore a badge and a gun. Flags will be flown at half staff on May 15th, Peace Officers Memorial Day, to publicly salute the service of law enforcement officers and honor fallen officers and their families.

Councilmember Schimmel arrived at 7:15 p.m.

MOTION ITEMS:

Ordinance (1st Reading) – Amending the Speed Limit Along a Portion of SR 4 (Allen Street): The Deputy City Clerk read the proposed ordinance by title only. Upon motion by Councilmember Roberson, seconded by Councilmember Schimmel, 'Pass on 1st Reading, 'AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KELSO AMENDING THE SPEED LIMIT ALONG A PORTION OF SR 4, ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE THEREFORE; AND REPEALING SECTION 1.C AND 1.D OF ORDINANCE NO. 2285; AND SUPERSEDING OVERLAPPING AREAS OF RESOLUTION NO. 396 AND RESOLUTION NO. 572.' Mayor Futcher reminded the audience that the Washington State Department of Transportation has requested traffic revisions to improve safety on SR4 by removing the existing mid-block crosswalk on Allen Street and installing a new marked crosswalk at 8th Avenue South. WSDOT has asked us to consider changing the speed limit from 35 mph to 25 mph beginning at 6th Avenue North.

<u>Paul Riley</u>, 703 ½ Allen, spoke from the audience about the residents who live in the three houses in the area and their need to have a safe place to cross the intersection. He also spoke about the need to enforce the speed limit.

<u>Rick Von Rock</u>, 400 N. 7th, asked for clarification of the proposed 25 speed limit change. At what point does it go back to 35 mph? Mayor Futcher said the proposal is to go from where it currently changes to 25 mph, right before the Chevron Station, all the way to Allen Drive.

Public Works Director David Sypher reminded citizens, although this is not a perfect solution, steps are being taken to make this a safer area.

Lengthy Council discussion followed. Motion carried, all voting yes.

Resolution No. 10-1020 – Declaring Items Surplus (various scrap metal, (8) 55-gallon metal drums, and (1) 30-yard drop box located at the Super 8 recycling site: The Deputy City Clerk read the proposed resolution by title only. Upon motion by Councilmember Schimmel, seconded by Councilmember Roberson, 'Pass Resolution No. 10-1020, 'A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF KELSO, WASHINGTON, DECLARING CERTAIN PERSONAL PROPERTY OF THE CITY OF KELSO TO BE SURPLUS AND DIRECTING THE DISPOSITION THEREOF.' Mayor Futcher said the resolution has been amended to include the 30-yard drop box. Motion carried, all voting yes.
